
WFP Cambodia Country Brief July 2019

SAVING LIVES CHANGING LIVES

Operational Context

Cambodia has achieved remarkable economic growth in the last two decades. The poverty rate has decreased from 47.8 percent in 2007 to 13.5 percent in 2014. The Government is committed to reaching middle-income country status by 2030. However, a significant portion of the population remains 'near poor' and still at high risk of falling back into poverty at the slightest shock. Undernutrition remains a public health concern; 32 percent of children under 5 years suffer from stunting, 24 percent are underweight, and 10 percent wasted. Micronutrient deficiencies are widespread. Cambodia is highly vulnerable to natural disasters, with regular monsoon flooding in the Mekong and Tonle Sap basin and localised droughts in the plains. Limited access for the poor to education and health services and low levels of investment in public infrastructure further perpetuate food insecurity and undernutrition.

WFP has been present in Cambodia since 1979.

Operational Updates

- WFP conducted a joint monitoring visit to a school meal programme in Siem Reap Province with Mrs. Michelle Calhoun, the Acting Deputy Administrator of the United States Department of Agriculture for the Office of Capacity Building and Development and a representative from the US Embassy in Cambodia. The mission allowed delegates to learn about and discuss the programme with key stakeholders including from relevant government ministries. The mission prioritised discussions about the national commitment and readiness to take over the school meal programme in the future.
- An independent consulting firm conducted data collection and analysis for the end-line evaluation of United States Department of Agriculture-supported school feeding programme (2017 -2019). The final report assessing the performance and results of the programme will be released in December. This will enable WFP Cambodia, the Government and cooperating partners to demonstrate achievements and identify areas to improve in future programmes. It will be especially relevant to the Government as it increases its leading role in the programme.
- WFP conducted a supply assessment for the homegrown school feeding programme (HGSFP) to capture feedback from suppliers on the revised quotation tools and processes. WFP will use the findings of the assessment to ensure that these processes and tools remain effective and relevant.

Operational Updates (continued)

organised the fourth cooking competition with participation from 149 school cooks in Oddor Meanchey Province. This is the fourth competition that WFP and the Ministry have run since 2016 and is held in a different WFP-targeted province each year. The competition aims to motivate school cooks from the school meal programme. It helps to raise cooks' awareness about the school meal programme and enabled them to explore and exchange ideas related to food service in schools and personal hygiene and food safety guidelines in the kitchen.



The cooking competition is one of the initiatives that WFP supports to recognise the contribution of school cooks, most of whom are women, in communities.



"Today I feel very excited to attend this competition as I can meet many cooks from other schools," Mrs Keo Roth, 50-year-old school cook who won the competition at the district level said. "I proudly say the blessing words that I received from schoolchildren and their parents at my school become real now. I won the first prize as they wished. Thank everyone at my school!" Mrs Keo Roth exclaimed her excitement with a winning medal and a certificate of recognition in her hands.
