Rationale

- 1. Iran has been grappling with the COVID-19 outbreak; Iranian officials reported the first confirmed COVID-19 cases on 19 February 2020 in Qom. As of 21 May 2020, according to Iranian health authorities, there have been 7,249 COVID-19 deaths in Iran with a total of around 129,341 infections across all 31 provinces. The Iranian Red Crescent Society (IRCS), WFP's counterpart in disaster response and the only non-governmental organization (NGO) mandated by the government to respond to emergencies, has reached out to WFP for assistance. As part of the national response system, the Government of Iran has asked IRCS to screen travelers at entrances of cities as well as at all points of entry into the country. To this end, 5,000 IRCS staff and volunteers require personal protective equipment (PPEs) for a period of 90 days to allow them to conduct the screenings in a safe manner. Considering the available budget, WFP will provide 2,000 IRCS staff and volunteers with PPEs for a period of two months.
 - 2. The COVID-19 outbreak has further worsened the economic situation in addition to being life threatening for those with underlying health conditions. WFP will augment food baskets with an extra ration of lentils (2 kg person/month) to refugees under its current assistance to ensure that the food security is met during the period, when most people are confined to their houses in order to avoid further spread of the virus. WFP through community health workers will hold personal hygiene sessions on correct handwashing and other personal preventive measures for refugee schoolchildren and teachers (when schools resume) and

provide hygiene material (e.g. soap and hand sanitizer) for all refugee beneficiaries residing in settlements as well as Iranian teachers who teach at schools inside settlements (when schools resume) to help combat COVID-19.

- 3. Apart from COVID-19, earlier in January 2020 torrential rains triggered severe flooding across south-eastern Iran. Given the urgency of the situation, in February 2020, WFP assisted more than 16,000 people, delivering 4,000 food parcels to the affected population in two cities of Iranshahr and Chabahar. As food and funds were not programmed under the emergency activity (activity 3), this has also been included in this revision.
- 4. School feeding activity has been introduced through budget revision (BR) 4. Following technical meetings with government counterparts and in order to align the project with national school feeding policies, WFP has been requested to include teachers in the school snacks programme.

Changes

Strategic orientation

5. This BR will revise the school feeding component of activity 2 and its outputs to include Iranian teachers. Activity 3 will also be revised to expand and include support to government with preparedness and response activities rather than solely on food assistance, considering the new COVID-19 emergency. Therefore, the activities and outputs are as follows:

[Original] Activity 2: Provide conditional support to refugees, especially women and girls to incentivize and facilitate educational and livelihood activities.

[Revised] Activity 2: Provide conditional support, especially to refugee women and girls, to incentivize and facilitate educational and livelihood activities.

[Original] Output: Schoolchildren at the primary and secondary school levels receive snacks every day they attend school.

[Revised] Output: Schoolchildren and teachers at the primary and secondary school levels receive snacks every day they attend school.

[Original] Activity 3: Provide emergency food assistance through cash-based or in-kind transfers to shock affected populations.

[Revised] Activity 3: Provide support to the Government for emergency preparedness and response, including the provision of emergency food assistance through cash-based or in-kind transfers to crisis-affected populations.

[New] Output: Crisis-affected populations benefit from enhanced capacities of the Government to prepare for and respond to emergencies.

- 6. Previous BRs:
 - > BR1 and BR2 were technical revisions.
 - BR3 (country director approval April 2019) added activity 3 in response to flood emergency. The budget increased from USD 18,021,543 to USD 18,621,543.
 - BR4 (country director approval October 2019) added capacity strengthening as a modality, added beneficiaries under activities 1 and 2, and introduced school feeding in settlement schools for 7,000 boys and girls. The budget increased from USD 18,621,543 to USD 19,846,288.

Strategic outcomes

Targeting approach and beneficiary analysis

- 7. Through this BR:
 - 500 Iranian teachers will be added under school feeding (activity 2) to align with the National School Feeding Policy. The modality of assistance for existing 4,800 beneficiaries has been changed from cash-based transfer (CBT) to capacity strengthening.
 - Under activity 3, 16,000 Iranians affected by flood will be added. As part of capacity strengthening support, schoolchildren and teachers at primary and secondary schools will participate in hygiene awareness activities when schools resume 31,000 existing refugee beneficiaries including schools and health centres inside settlements will receive hygiene kits 5,000 Iranian staff and volunteers from IRCS will receive PPE kits.

Transfer modalities

- 8. Capacity strengthening will be added as a modality under activity 3 for the provision of non-food items to IRCS and activity 1 for the provision of hygiene kits.
- 9. Iranian school teachers added under activity 2 will receive school snacks (food modality).

Supply chain challenges

- 10. Procurement of the food basket, as well as hygiene items for beneficiaries will be done locally. The only foreseen challenge is inflation in prices considering the continuation of sanctions and the consequent economic downturn. WFP will continue to monitor the price and market fluctuations and adapt as needed, particularly to ensure beneficiaries maintain purchasing power.
- 11. The PPEs will be procured regionally through the United Nations Humanitarian Response Depot (UNHRD) and airlifted to Tehran. Due to huge global demand for PPEs, price hikes and long lead times for production may be encountered.

Monitoring and evaluation

12. The current monitoring and evaluation (M&E) arrangements will be expanded to cover the newly added emergency initatives.

Cost breakdown

13. The changes in this BR will be covered through a donation from the Government of Japan. Sixty percent of the funding has been allocated to support Iranians via the IRCS through purchasing PPE kits, 35 percent has been allocated to ensure augmented food and cash distribution to the vulnerable refugees and 5 percent for training refugee children on personal hygiene issues and providing all beneficiaries with hygiene items (hand sanitizer and liquid soap).
