### RATIONALE

- 1. This is the fifth budget revision to the Myanmar Country Strategic Plan (CSP 2018 2022). Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, international and domestic supply chains have been disrupted as a result of restrictions on air passenger and cargo movement, the slowdown of the local economy, travel bans and lockdown procedures. As a direct consequence, the current capacity of the national health system to prevent and control the spread of the disease has been limited, and supplier capacity to meet the increasing demands of essential medical supplies such as COVID test kits and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) has been reduced. These new factors linked to COVID-19 make the country more vulnerable and limit its capacity to respond to other risks such as natural hazards and conflict.
- 2. The current budget revision 5 will cover the period June 2020 December 2022.

### CHANGES

#### Strategic orientation

- 3. WFP proposes to include a new Strategic Outcome 4 contributing to Strategic Result 8 (Enhancing Global Partnerships) / Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 17 for the provision of services to humanitarian organizations in Myanmar.
- 4. Complementing the implementation of food/cash assistance and capacity strengthening under the existing Strategic Outcomes 1-3, Strategic Outcome 4 will enable humanitarian and development partners to access reliable, on-demand services in times of crisis.

### Strategic outcomes

- 5. In the current global outbreak of COVID-19, WFP has a key role to ensure the continuity of humanitarian supply chains and uninterrupted provision of urgently needed humanitarian supplies. Through the Myanmar Humanitarian Response Plan, WFP and partners seek to support government preparedness and response efforts to counter the threat of COVID-19. To this end, WFP plans to establish and coordinate a platform for the provision of common humanitarian logistics services to ensure the timely delivery of health and other essential humanitarian supplies in an increasingly complex COVID-19 scenario.
- 6. Therefore, WFP plans to add a new Strategic Outcome under the crisis response focus area:

## Strategic Outcome 4: Humanitarian and development partners in Myanmar have access to reliable common services

Under this Strategic Outcome, WFP pursues the following output:

# Output: Affected populations benefit from the humanitarian common services to humanitarian organizations in order to receive timely humanitarian assistance. (Output Category: H, K)

through a new activity:

# Activity 10: Provide on-demand services to humanitarian and development partners. (Act Category 10: CPA)

- 7. Activity 10 will facilitate storage and logistics services, procurement of non-food items, as well as common administrative services. The latter can include shared office premises, ICT, vehicle pooling systems and other services where WFP has recognized expertise and existing capacity. The activity will be implemented exclusively through a service delivery modality. WFP aims to increase synergies and efficiencies in interagency collaboration, in particular under the Humanitarian Response Plan, through the provision of common logistics and procurement services. It will also provide a framework for longer-term partnerships under the Socio-Economic Response Plan and position WFP strategically as a partner of choice for the Government to augment, where required appropriate, its own programmes in response to COVID-19.
- 8. The provision of on-demand services delivered under Activity 10 will be supported by a cost recovery mechanism. The addition of Activity 10 will allow for improved transparency and financial reporting on relevant collaboration between WFP and humanitarian partners.
- 9. For this and future emergency response operations, the activity proposed under this budget revision aims to provide administrative and logistics solutions to address operational barriers in the existing response. To overcome these challenges, WFP on behalf of the humanitarian community (i) ensures logistics arrangements are in place at Yangon airport where partners may face bottlenecks; (ii) consolidates and augments logistics capacity to standardize cargo clearance procedures and to facilitate downstream delivery and storage within Myanmar; and; (iii) enhances existing

coordination mechanisms through sharing of logistics resources, assets and supply chain information to improve pipeline visibility of inbound relief supplies into Myanmar (iv) common administrative services including common facilities/premises, travel and fuel services, IT, finance services which aims to accelerate the harmonization of efforts of business process and reduce the duplication of functions and administrative and transaction costs provided to humanitarian partners which are also related to the Business Operations Strategy (BOS).

10. No substantive changes to existing partnerships with current stakeholders are foreseen, and no increase in Country Office capacity is needed as a result of adding the Service Delivery modality. Any financial risk to the project due to the cost-sharing nature of service provision will be mitigated by implementing cost reductions and by sourcing additional participating agencies.

### COST BREAKDOWN

11. The additional costs covered in this budget revision are all related to the newly added activity 10 under Strategic Outcome 4.
