## WFP URGENTLY REQUIRES AN ADDITIONAL US\$ 33 MILLION:

- ✓ To ensure critical cold chain capacity at the most strategic hubs for future response needs

## **CURRENT OUTLOOK**

WFP designed and built its COVID-19 Common Services to be flexible and driven by partner requirements. To honour this commitment WFP has accepted all final requests for cargo transport. In parallel, WFP is expanding its infrastructure at critical hubs to meet potential cold chain storage and transport needs for the next phase of the response and for any future health responses. WFP is also committed to continuing passenger flights where no other viable options exist, ensuring that both essential personnel and light cargo - including critical items such as vaccines - can continue to reach destinations for as long as they are needed by partners.

However, without an urgent injection of funds, **all services will end as of 15 January** and, against an operational backdrop of continued uncertainty, WFP will not be able to maintain its strategic capacity should it need to step up again.
