




Operational Context

The conflict in Syria is taking a devastating toll on the lives of the Syrian people. As of August 2020, some 6.7 million Syrians are internally displaced and 5.6 million are registered as refugees outside of the country in the largest displacement crisis since World War II.

Since late 2019, the humanitarian situation has deteriorated to levels not previously seen in the country's recent history: Soaring food and fuel prices, stagnant salaries, loss of livelihoods and reduced food production have led to widespread food insecurity. As of 2020, WFP estimates that 9.3 million people are food insecure in Syria with a further 2.2 million people at risk of food insecurity. Since 2011, WFP has been providing food, nutrition and livelihoods assistance to crisis-affected Syrian families in the country. WFP has been active in Syria since 1964.

Operational Updates

- In November, WFP delivered food and nutrition assistance to 4.7 million people across its General Food Assistance (GFA), School Feeding, Nutrition, and Livelihoods, Resilience and Social Safety Netsactivities in Syria.
- WFP dispatched GFA to some 4.5 million people across all 14 Syrian governorates. Of this, 30 percent was delivered through the cross-border operation from Turkey to areas of Idlib and western rural Aleppo governorates not accessible from inside Syria.
- The security situation in north-western Syria remained volatile over the month of November. Violence and hostilities at the beginning of the month reportedly spurred a limited wave of population displacement from areas along the frontlines of southern Idlib governorate. In response, WFP in November assisted some 19,350 with emergency food assistance through ready-toeat rations in the affected areas. WFP has sufficient stocks of RTEs should the situation deteriorate further.
- In north-eastern Syria, a combination of partial and full lockdown measures was implemented by Kurdish authorities in November, following a surge in the number of COVID-19 cases. This included a partial lockdown in all Kurdish-held areas (including Qamishli city, where WFP's field office is located). WFP activities in the areas are continuing in accordance with the curfew restrictions, taking all necessary precautions in line with the country office-developed COVID-19 mitigation measures and standard operating procedures.
- According to WFP data released in November, food prices in Syria continued to increase, with the nationwide average price of the WFP standard

Strategic Result 1: Everyone has access to food

Strategic Outcome 1: Food insecure populations affected by the crisis, including host communities, IDPs and returnees, in all governorates, have access to life-saving food to meet their basic food needs all year round. **Focus area:** Crisis Response

Activities:

- Provision of general food assistance in the form of regular in-kind monthly food rations and ready-to-eat rations in the initial phase of displacement.
- 2. Provision of school feeding for pre- and primary school children in regular schools and CBT to out-of-school children enrolled in informal education or alternate learning opportunities.

Strategic Result 1: Everyone has access to food

Strategic Outcome 2: Food insecure families in urban and rural areas affected by the crisis are enabled to meet their basic food and nutrition needs and increase their self-reliance throughout the year.

Focus area: Resilience Building

Activities:

 Provision of livelihood support through household- and communal-level asset creation through food assistance for assets (FFA) activities and enhanced human capital through food assistance for training (FFT).

Strategic Result 2: No one suffers from malnutrition

Strategic Outcome 3: Nutritionally vulnerable groups, especially children and pregnant and lactating women and girls, across the Syrian Arab Republic have reduced levels of malnutrition throughout the year. **Focus area:** Resilience Building

Activities:

- 4. Prevention of acute malnutrition and micronutrient deficiencies in children aged 6–23 months and pregnant and lactating women and girls.
- Treatment of moderate acute malnutrition in children aged 6-59 months and pregnant and lactating women and girls.

Strategic Result 8: Sharing of knowledge, expertise and technology, strengthen global partnership support to country efforts to achieve the SDGs

Strategic Outcome 4: Humanitarian partners across the Syrian Arab Republic benefit from augmented logistics and emergency telecommunications capacity and services, enabling them to provide humanitarian assistance throughout the crisis.

Focus area: Crisis Response

Activities:

- Provide coordination, information management, capacity development and shared logistics services to sector partners that face logistics gaps.
- Provide shared ICT services, emergency telecommunications coordination and information technology (IT) emergency preparedness training to humanitarian organizations in common operational areas.
- 8. Provide technical assistance and support services to humanitarian partners.
- Provide passenger and light cargo services to the humanitarian community (United Nations Humanitarian Air Service, UNHAS).

reference food basket in October reaching SYP 88,138 (approximately USD 70 at the current official exchange rate), a five percent increase from September. Food prices had by the end of October increased by 247 percent year-on-year, and were 22.8 times the five-year pre-crisis average.

Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

- Approximately 31,412 COVID-19 cases and 787 deaths have been confirmed across all areas of Syria. This includes 8,059 cases and 424 deaths reported in government-controlled areas as of 03 December; 16,289 cases and 166 deaths reported in northwestern Syria as of 02 December, and 7,064 cases and 197 deaths reported in north-eastern Syria as of 02 December.
- Due to a surge in COVID-19 cases reported in northeastern Syria in November, Kurdish authorities imposed full lockdown on several areas, including the cities of Al-Hasakeh, Qamishly and Al-Malikia town (Al-Hasakeh governorate) and Ar-Raqqa city (Ar-Raqqa governorate).
- To date, WFP, in cooperation with the World Health Organization (WHO), has provided food assistance to 12,750 people in COVID-19 quarantine centres across six Syrian governorates.

Monitoring

- In November, WFP and third-party monitoring (TPM)
 companies conducted 1,051 on-site monitoring (OSM)
 checklists across all 14 governorates to monitor GFA
 distributions, bread distributions, livelihoodsactivities, nutrition activities, CBT redemptions and
 warehouses.
- Of the OSM checklists conducted, WFP monitors conducted 166 checklists, equivalent to 16 percent direct WFP monitoring coverage. The rest of the checklists were conducted by TPMs in areas not accessible to WFP due to the security situation, lack of approvals or temporary logistical constraints.

Challenges

• WFP requires US\$ 308.6 million to sustain operations through May 2021.
