# Philippines country strategic plan, revision 6

## 1. RATIONALE

- 1. This budget revision aims to increase the requirements of emergency response under Strategic Outcome 1, Activity 1 of the country strategic plan (CSP) from December 2020 to December 2021.
- 2. Following a series of strong typhoons that hit the country towards the end of 2020, WFP plans to augment the response through cash-based transfers (CBT) covering the period from December 2020 through to the first half of 2021. WFP also envisions early recovery activities towards the end of 2021. Super Typhoon Rolly (Goni) and Typhoon Ulysses (Vamco) hit the Philippines in succession last October 30 and November 11, 2020, respectively, leaving 905,000 individuals (181,000 households) vulnerable and in need of assistance. The UN-Government joint rapid assessment shows that Super Typhoon Rolly largely affected Bicol (Region 5), particularly the Catanduanes and provinces of Albay, rendering a large portion of the population displaced and food insecure. Typhoon Ulysses, aggravated by the unexpected release of a huge volume of water from Magat Dam, caused a widespread and massive flooding in Cagayan Valley (Region 2) and destroyed the livelihood sources especially agriculture and fisheries.
- 3. On November 3, 2020, the National Government through the Department of Foreign Affairs invited UNCT to provide technical and material contributions to complement government efforts for the affected populations. The Department of Social Welfare and Development recognized their response gaps in the areas of beneficiary registration, cash assistance and logistical support as most of its resources have already been exhausted for COVID-19 response.
- 4. The food security and nutrition situation in these regions have considerably been impacted by COVID-19 prior to the typhoons. Thirty-nine percent (39%) of the

households in Region 5 were already food insecure and 27 percent in Region 2 (SAP PDM). This is largely due to significant drop in the family's income as reported by 75 percent of households (HH) in Region 2 and 85 percent in Region 5, secondary to work restrictions, loss of employment and decrease in salaries and wages. To address their food need, most of the HH (82 percent in Region 2 and 85 percent in Region 5) have resolved to adopt negative coping strategy.

- 5. Moreover, 72 percent of the HH in both regions cannot afford a nutritious diet which is a major factor in having a high magnitude of child undernutrition. Children in these regions are eating less both in terms of quantity and quality. In Region 2, 74.6 percent of children under-two years old are not consuming the Minimum Acceptable Diet (MAD) and the rate is even higher in Region 5 at 83.7 percent.
- 6. The COVID-19 pandemic has significantly tested the government's readiness to mobilize its internal resources to respond to crises and the unforeseen extent of damaged these typhoons brought has added another blow to the government's coffers. WFP envisages the need to increase its readiness actions and, therefore, its direct assistance in support to the government effort while WFP continues to implement its capacity strengthening activities.

# 2. CHANGES

# Strategic orientation

7. This is the sixth budget revision of the Philippines CSP 2018-2023. As the five previous revisions<sup>1</sup>, it remains within the overall strategic orientation of the CSP.

# Strategic outcomes

8. Strategic Outcome 1: Crisis-affected people in the Philippines are able to meet their food and nutrition needs during and immediately after an emergency

Activity 1: Provide food, and when possible, nutrition assistance through the governments' safety net or partners to affected communities following natural disasters or human-induced shocks and disruptions.

Under this activity, WFP provides cash assistance to people affected by natural disasters or human-induced shocks. In response to the recent typhoon, WFP plans an emergency operation targeting 81,840 people in the provinces of Albay and Catanduanes in Region 5 (Bicol) and in the province of Cagayan and other areas in Region 2 (Cagayan Valley). A portion of the unconditional cash transfer (URT\_GD) beneficiaries will also be the beneficiaries for the conditional cash grant (URT-FFA).

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Revision 1, approved by the Country Director in August 2018, increased the budget by USD 7,667,295 and allowed the CSP to absorb remaining resources from the Protected Relief and Recovery Operation (PRRO) 200743. Revision 2 was a technical revision. Revision 3, approved by the Country Director in April 2019, increased the CSP budget by USD 1,754,109 for the emergency response in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao (BARMM). Revision 4, approved by the Executive Director in January 2020, increased the budget by USD 8,571,565 and was a comprehensive revision to increase Activities 1, 3 and 5. Revision 5, approved by the Country Director in September 2020, decreased the budget by USD 4,052,959 and reflected adjustments made for the shift from direct delivery to capacity strengthening.

- 9. The typhoon response will be implemented in partnership with the Government's Department for Social Welfare and Development and local government units, Western Union (WFP's corporate partner) utilizing WFP's corporate beneficiary and transfer management platform (SCOPE), and non-governmental organizations that target women and children in their responses. Under Activity 1, WFP will hire additional staff to coordinate and manage the implementation of SCOPE for both registration and pay-outs as well as any potential partnerships around WFP's digital solutions (i.e. common cash platform).
- 10. WFP will make use of its existing post-distribution monitoring tool that was used to support the Government in analysing the impact of the Social Amelioration Programme during the initial phase of the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon request from the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD), WFP may provide assistance regarding beneficiary registration and monitoring (PDM).
