#### Sri Lanka country strategic plan, revision 3

#### 1. RATIONALE

- 1. This budget revision aims to increase the requirements of Strategic Outcome 2 and activity 2 and Strategic Outcome 4 (Activity 6 and Activity 7) of the country strategic plan (CSP) until December 2022.
- 2. With the heavy impact of COVID-19 on the country's economy and the Government's sudden fertilizer import ban, it is predicted that there will be at least a 30 percent reduction in the production of rice resulting in an increase in food prices (mainly for rice) in 2022. At the same time, it is likely that the government's contribution to the school meals programme (SMP) will remain constant due to the unprecedented financial crisis that the Government of Sri Lanka is currently facing. This would mean that school meal providers require additional support in order to deliver meals as planned. In this scenario, the complete transition of SMP to a national programme by 2022 as envisaged in the CSP is not realistic. As a result, WFP extends its implementation under the SMP with this revision.
- 3. WFP has exhausted the original needs-based plan for Strategic Outcome 4. Additional commitments of USD 4.2 million are anticipated, which calls for an increase in the planning.
- 4. Part of multi-year contributions received against activity 7 will be carried over to next CSP (anticipated to start in 2023).
- 5. This revision will be applicable to the 6-month period ending 31 December 2021 and for the year 2022.

# 2. CHANGES

## Strategic orientation

- 6. This budget revision does not change the strategic orientation of the Sri Lanka CSP. The four strategic outcomes are still relevant and contribute to the achievement of national food and nutrition security targets.
- 7. There have been two previous revisions of this CSP:
  - Revision 1 adjusted the ISC rate from 7 to 6.5 percent.
  - Revision 2 was a technical revision.

# Strategic outcomes

- 8. Targeting approach and beneficiary analysis.
  - Under Activity 2, WFP will provide assistance to additional beneficiaries under the SMP, complementing the national programme with a focus on lean season and geographic areas of high vulnerability. In 2022, WFP is planning to provide food assistance to an increased number of beneficiaries complementing the national SMP, especially during the lean season and where the vulnerability would be the highest. Since there is no budgetary provisions for new caseloads and food component in year 2021 and 2022, current budget revision aims to include the required transfer value under the activity 2.
  - Under Activity 6, WFP will target primarily smallholder farmers through food assistance for assets and food assistance for training programmes. The original target will be reduced as some groups (returning refugees and resettling internally displaced persons) will be reached by other partners, particularly the International Organization for Migration.
- 9. *Transfer modalities.* This revision adds the food transfer modality to Activity 2 for 2021 and 2022, complementing the assistance from school meal providers under the SMP.

# 10. Partnerships.

- Under Activity 6, WFP will assist beneficiaries (primarily smallholder farmers), through integrated application of the food assistance for assets, food for training programmes and capacity strengthening, in the creation and rebuilding of productive community assets and the diversification of livelihoods. WFP expects to receive new funding for South-South and Triangular Cooperation (SSTC) activities for 2021/2022. The additional funding will support post-harvest management and market linkages for small holders and to procure maize to produce Triposha (fortified blended food for moderately acute malnourished children and pregnant and nursing mothers) and the construction of two silos to support the storage of grains during its processing stages.
- 11. *Transition/handover strategy.* The complete transition to a national SMP envisaged by Activity 2 in the original CSP will not be feasible. Support from WFP aims to complement national programming with a view towards national ownership. Transition will be explored more fully in the subsequent CSP, which is in the early phases of design.

# Beneficiary analysis

12. Table 1 outlines the changes in beneficiaries. Most of the increase results from the addition of SMP beneficiaries in 2021 and 2022. There are adjustments within Activity 6 resulting from consultations with Government as well as changes in field requirements and other partner investments.
