2021 highlights



WFP reached over 1.7 million food insecure people through activities implemented under the five strategic outcomes of its country strategic plan: crisis response, school feeding, nutrition, support to smallholder farmers facing climate shocks, and emergency preparedness.


Food assistance provided by WFP played a key role in averting catastrophe in drought-affected southern Madagascar. Furthermore, WFP was the largest provider of school meals in this part of the island.

WFP continued to strengthen its partnerships with the Government, local communities, and other UN agencies, helping to advance policies and progress towards the SDGs.



Cross cutting results

While women face inequal challenges in Madagascar, in line with the corporate Gender Action Plan, WFP is committed to integrating gender equality and women's empowerment in all its work in the country.

In 2021, WFP continued to implement and strengthen protection place considerations to the population, communities. and affected individuals at the heart of its activities in Madagascar. Affected populations benefit from WFP programmes in a manner that ensures and promotes their safety, dignity and integrity as well as their hunger needs.

In Madagascar, WFP is implementing a range of activities that help communities prepare for, respond to, and recover from climate shocks. WFP is also greening its operation through the setting-up of a water irrigation project and the installation of solar-power water systems in its suboffices.


WFP supports the Malagasy Government through collaboration with Ministries (Agriculture and Livestock; Population, Social Protection and Promotion of Women; National Education; Public Health) and government institutions (National Nutrition Office; National Office for Risk and Disaster Management), with donor governments contributions. WFP also works along with UN Agencies; Non-Governmental Organizations and the private sector.

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Strategic outcome 1: Crisis-affected women, men, boys and girls in targeted areas are able to meet their basic food and nutrition needs before, during and after crises





180,000 acutely food insecure people received cash-based transfers through the national social protection programme



110,000 poor urban households economically affected by COVID-19 lockdowns received cashbased transfers



135,171 children admitted to WFP's moderate acute malnutrition prevention programme



11,306 tuberculosis patients supported with food, cash, nutrition assessment counselling, and support. <u>_</u>

233,635 beneficiaries assisted with specialized nutritious foods and nutrition messaging each month.

Strategic outcome 2 : Primary school children in targeted areas have access to adequate, healthy and nutritious food as part of a Government-led social protection strategy



818 schools assisted through food distribution



245,723 schoolchildren supported with school meals by WEP



Strategic outcome 3: Nutritionally vulnerable populations in areas with consistently high rates of undernutrition have improved nutritional status



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12,064 children aged 6-59 months and 18,597 pregnant and lactating women and girls supported through stunting prevention activities.

12 new school canteens built to help prevent malnutrition

17 gari and 2 breadfruit flour production units built to improve the transformation and the preservation of these staple foods

391 farmers' organizations reached through a WFP project to preserve, transform, and fortify basic food items

Strategic outcome 4: Women and men smallholder producers in targeted communities facing climate shocks increase their capacity to access profitable markets and establish more inclusive, efficient and resilient food systems all year round



7,277 smallholder farmers trained in postharvest loss reduction to strengthen agricultural livelihoods



3,500 smallholder farmers supported with insurance, savings, and climate-adapted agriculture practices training



40 women's groups supported with the processing of cassava into gari, cactus into jam, the smoking of fish, and

soapmaking

25,925 people benefitting from the rehabilitation and construction of productive assets like irrigation canals, drains, and dikes

Strategic outcome 5: Government and humanitarian partners in Madagascar are supported by effective emergency preparedness and response arrangements before, during and after crises



25,480 mobile surveys completed to monitor the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on national food security.



WFP conducted a capacity needs mapping exercise to strengthen the government's capacity to deliver emergency services and supplies.



WFP, the national disaster risk and management office, and Malagasy Ministry of Posts and Telecommunications established clusters for ICT coordination in emergencies, along with a drone sub-cluster.



644 passengers were transported by the United Nations Humanitarian Air Service to remote locations in southern Madagascar.
