In 2021, the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) in Sri Lanka assisted 183,683 people, including school children and people with pre-existing vulnerabilities and those economically affected by COVID-19, under four strategic outcomes.







WFP assisted the above targeted beneficiaries (some of whom received more than one type of assistance) amidst several challenges including school closures and COVID-19 restrictions. Since no major disaster occurred in 2021, the number of people reached in emergency response efforts was lower than planned.

# COVID-19 Response




**174,055** school children received canned fish among whom **39,345** children received take home rations.

Procured maize to provide **1,304,070** packets of Thripsha (a supplementary food product) to pregnant/nursing mothers and children.



Cash assistance to **1,517** vulnerable pregnant and nursing mothers.

## WFP's Support to the People of Sri Lanka

2021 was a challenging year against a backdrop of COVID-19 restrictions. In spite of this, WFP continued with its on-going projects, especially in building the resilience of rural communities against climate shocks. WFP also responded to emerging needs and emergencies, including supporting fishing families affected by the MV X-Press Pearl marine disaster. This complemented WFP's on-going technical assistance towards improving national capacities in emergency preparedness and response.

## WFP's Work to Strengthen Institutional Capacities

Building on its advocacy efforts, WFP conducted trainings to enhance policymakers' knowledge on the cost of a nutritious family meal. WFP also conducted a feasibility assessment on rice fortification in the national school meal programme to evaluate its roll-out across the country. Furthermore, WFP supported with food security analyses, including assisting the Department of Census and Statistics to report achievement of indicators related to Sustainable Development Goal 2: Zero Hunger.
