Management Response from WFP Ghana to the recommendations of the decentralized evaluation of the Enhanced Nutrition and Value Chains (ENVAC) Project, 2016-2021, in Ghana (DE/GHCO/2021/003) from April 2021 to September 2021

- 1. This document, finalized in April 2022, presents the management response to the recommendations of the final evaluation of the Enhanced Nutrition and Value Chains (ENVAC) Project (2016-2021).
- 2. The evaluation, which was commissioned by WFP Ghana covers all activities implemented within the framework of the Enhanced Nutrition and Value Chain Project between March 2016 and June 2021. The evaluation serves the dual purpose of accountability and learning and as such, the evaluation 1) assessed and reported on the performance and results of the project, and 2) identified reasons why certain results were achieved or not achieved, to draw lessons and recommendations for learning.
- 3. The evaluation made 8 key recommendations with 21 actions to be taken. The matrix sets out whether WFP agrees, partially agrees or disagrees with the recommendations and sub-recommendations. It presents the planned (or taken) actions, responsibilities, and timelines.
