Furthermore, the ethical approach is adequately described, making reference to the principles of confidentiality and equitable participation of individuals. The findings include a good gender analysis and also discuss the unanticipated effects of the project on gender equality. However, the voices of women and vulnerable groups could have been presented more clearly in the findings. Even so, GEWE considerations are well integrated in the conclusions and recommendations.
