WFP CHIEF VISITS INDIA, HAILS FOOD SECURTY SCHEMES

WFP's Executive Director, David Beasley, visited India in July, during which he held high-level discussions and observed the functioning of the country's safety net programmes .

During his three-day visit (17-19 July), Mr. Beasley met the Minister of External Affairs, S. Jaishankar, Minister of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare, Narendra Singh Tomar and Vice Chairman of NITI Aayog, Suman Bery. He also met the Minister of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution, Piyush Goyal.

"With the world's largest food safety-net programs, India is a shining example of how effective social protection can play a critical role in achieving food security - especially now as the world faces an unprecedented global hunger crisis. Lessons learnt from India can guide other nations and I encourage India to share its success story with the world," he said. "It is also exciting that India will be taking over the G20 presidency. I look forward to its leadership on various issues, including food security," he added.

In New Delhi, Mr. Beasley visited a school meal preparation facility run by Akshaya Patra that provides hot meals to 25,000 students in government schools in the capital. India's school meal programme also known as *Prime Minister Poshan* covers close to 110 million school children with hot-cooked meals, daily.

He also visited a public food distribution centre in New Delhi that provides subsidised rations to vulnerable families. <u>Read more</u>

WFP SUPPORTED PUBLIC SYSTEMS LAB AT IIT DELHI INAUGURATED BY PIYUSH GOYAL

The lab has been established by WFP and IIT Delhi for developing scalable solutions for civic systems and services that impact millions.

"Artificial Intelligence and automation can help us transform the public delivery system and I hope this lab will be the harbinger of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision of making India a developed nation. Thanks to Bishow Parajuli from WFP and IIT Delhi who have partnered in this very important and pathbreaking initiative." Shri. Piyush Goyal said.

"Public Systems or social welfare systems deliver basic entitlements to citizens. WFP works closely with the government towards making these efficient and effective through innovation, research, incubation models, or processes. The launch of Public Systems Lab will augment and strengthen the impact of public systems at scale, especially when it comes to ensuring inclusion," Mr. Bishow Parajuli, Representative and Country Director, WFP India, said.

WFP SUPPORTED MOBILE STORAGE COMES UP IN DEHRADUN

Due to the lack of adequate storage facilities, farmers and procurement agencies must rely on Open storage or Cover and Plinth storage (CAP) techniques that have higher risk of losses due to the climatic conditions (rain, heat, and snow) as well as pest and rodent infestations which renders grains unfit for human consumption. It leads to large post-harvest losses, resulting in reduced income for the famers.

To address this challenge, WFP India has been working with the Government of India for increasing storage capacities, especially via Mobile Storage Units (MSU) that are used by WFP globally.

In the month of August, WFP installed the third MSU in Rudrapur with 500 MT capacity at Food Cooperation of India's Depot in Rudrapur.

Smart warehouse is equipped with wireless sensors such as temperature, humidity, CO2, Infra Red Motion censors, air flow, door, fire, phosphine gas, and oxygen.

WFP will undertake smart warehouse projects at six locations on a pilot basis.

Bishow Parajuli, Representative and Country Director, WFP, India, and Dr. Neelam Patel, Senior Advisor, Agriculture, NITI Aayog.

Representatives from ICAR, State & Central Government Department, State, and Central Agriculture Universities, FPO, NGOs, Start-ups, Academia & Research, ICRISAT, and ICID participated in this event.

In the run-up to celebrating the International Year of Millets 2023, NITI Aavog conducted a technical workshop on the development of a good practice compendium on mainstreaming millets and a scale-up strategy as part of the initiative.

STATE LEVEL MEDIA WORKSHOP IN UP ON RICE FORTIFICATION

A state-level media workshop on rice fortification was organised in Lucknow on 10 August by WFP to create awareness among journalists and editors on the issues around fortification and governments vision to reduce anaemia and micronutrient deficiencies through it.

Arun Kumar, Additional Commissioner, Food & Supplies Department, addressed the media during the workshop and informed that fortified rice is being rolled out in the state through the food safety net schemes such as Antyodaya Ann Yojana, Targeted Public Distribution System, PM-POSHAN and ICDS.

Fortified rice offers a huge potential to improve the anaemia situation in the state, (more than 50% prevalence among women and children) especially if provided through the food safety net schemes.



Sessions on fortified rice, its status in the food-based safety net programmes in Uttar Pradesh was conducted as part of the workshop. A discussion on the myths and misconceptions prevalent in the community around fortified rice was also organized.

The event was attended by officials from Food & Civil Supplies, FCI, state MDM Authority, Health Department, academicians from King George's Medical University, Ram Manohar Lohia Institute of Medical Sciences, Era Medical College, Lucknow University, Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University, Central Food Technological Research Institute, Food Safety and Drug Administration development organizations working on nutrition, rice millers, FRK manufacturers, and fair price shop owners.
