In 2022, WFP implemented or supported school meal programmes in 83 COUNTRIES



WFP provided school meals or snacks for 20 MILLION CHILDREN in 59 countries, of which 49% WERE GIRLS




WFP scaled up school meals operations in humanitarian or fragile settings in 16 COUNTRIES

- In 2022 WFP launched the global report: School meals are again one of the most extensive social safety nets in the world. 418 million children receive school
 - meals globally.

Global investment increased from US\$43 billion to 48 billion,

- 99% of its domestic financing. Low-income countries have increased their domestic
- financing by 15%. Despite this progress coverage is lowest where it is needed
