Operational Context

Türkiye hosts the highest number of refugees in the world four million people. Around 53,000 of the most vulnerable of them live in eight camps in the southeast, while the majority live in cities and villages throughout the country. The Government of Türkiye has demonstrated leadership and generosity in hosting this large number for close to a decade. Since June 2014, a temporary protection regime has granted Syrian refugees access to basic services such as healthcare and education. Refugees from other countries continue to benefit from International Protection status. WFP reestablished a presence in Türkiye in 2012, in response to the Syria crisis. Following the twin earthquakes that struck southeastern Türkiye on 6 February 2023, WFP stepped up its assistance and launched an emergency response operation to respond to the most urgent needs of affected populations.

WFP Türkiye's new Country Strategic Plan (CSP 2023-2025) which was approved in November 2022 seeks to assist refugees in camps and provide services to humanitarian and development partners. The CSP expands sustainable livelihood programming to build the self-reliance of vulnerable Turks and refugees alike. The CSP has been revised to integrate the earthquake emergency response including food and multi-purpose cash assistance to refugees and Turks alike, as well as logistics and telecommunications services for partners in the earthquake-affected regions.

Operational Updates

- Under the e-voucher programme WFP co-implements with Turkey Red Cross (TRC) in eight refugee camps, 52,663 beneficiaries (11,440 households) received Turkish Lira (TRY) 300 (USD 11) per person monthly. The Presidency of Migration Management (PMM) announced that Kilis camp assisted by WFP would be closed by December 2023. Vulnerable households with special needs will be moved to the Adana camp and the rest will be provided with cash assistance to support their movement to other cities (except for Istanbul) or back to Syria by PMM. So far, 103 households have left the camp, including 46 households with special needs who were moved to Adana camp and 18 households who opted to move back to Syria.
- WFP's livelihoods activities under the umbrella of the Socioeconomic Empowerment and Sustainability (SES) Programme continued in October in nine provinces (Adana, Ankara, Bursa, Istanbul, Izmir, Kayseri, Konya, Mersin and Sanliurfa). Some 2,056 people benefited indirectly from the programme through the participation of 514 trainees in the vocational training courses in a variety of sectors (Barista, Chef Assistant, CNC Operator, CNC Wood, Control and Measurement Instruments Technician, Corporate Communication Support Staff, EMPACT, Machine Maintenance and Repair, Pastry Chef Assistant, Shoe Making, Welding).
- The SES Programme has been providing vocational and applied training to refugees and members of host communities with the aim of enhancing livelihoods opportunities, fostering economic self-reliance and advancing sustainable development. The Early Recovery component of the SES Programme, co-initiated by WFP and the Association for Solidarity with Asylum Seekers and Migrants (ASAM) in April was completed on 30 The initiative provided livelihood September. opportunities to 600 earthquake-affected people by placing them in jobs in various sectors for three months in Adiyaman, Gaziantep, Hatay, Kahramanmaras, Malatya and Sanliurfa.

Assessment

Preliminary findings of the Needs Assessment in WFPassisted Refugee Camps were shared. WFP RBC continues to support detailed analysis to inform targeting discussions and transitional programme design. Initial findings demonstrate that one third of the in-camp residents are highly vulnerable, half of them rely on WFP assistance as their main source of income, and the high majority do not have any plans to leave the camps.

Partnerships

 In October, WFP published a call for proposals on UN Partnership Portal for organizations to submit project proposals aimed at the restoration and revitalization of the food and nutrition sector in the earthquake-affected areas by enhancing the capacity of food value chain actors.

Monitoring

- Market Price Monitoring, On-Site Monitoring, and Protection Report Q3 2023 is published in October. The report indicates that annual inflation and food inflation reached 61.5 percent and 75.1 percent respectively in September 2023. In line with overall price increases, the cost of the food basket for Syrian refugees has increased by 17 percent between Q2 and Q3 and reached TRY 803 (USD 29) per person per month in September 2023. The food basket for Ukrainian refugees costed TRY 740 (USD 27) in the same period. Overall, beneficiaries and retailers are satisfied with the e-voucher programme but some challenges were raised by a limited number of respondents. The number of complaints increased in this quarter primarily due to delays in placing the "Point of sale" machines in the Apaydin camp markets.
- The In-camp On-site Factsheet, covering August-October 2023, was published in October. WFP field teams conducted 31 field visits and carried out surveys with 46 beneficiaries during the reporting period. Malfunction of POS machines and cold storage units, unavailability of price tags in either Turkish or Arabic, spoilage of some products due to power outages, issues with cleanliness and freshness of fruits and vegetables were noted by the field teams in some contracted shops. Findings are being addressed by WFP for necessary action.
- Minimum Expenditure Basket (MEB) representing the minimum amount required to meet essential needs (food, NFI, health, education. accommodation, communication, and transportation) has reached TRY 2022 (USD 73) per person per month in October 2023. Similarly, the earthquake MEB, tailored based on profiles of earthquake affected population, is estimated to cost TRY 2172 (USD 78) per person in the same period. The MEB values continue to be utilized by WFP and wider humanitarian actors operating in Turkiye to inform cash response design in and out of the earthquake region.
