

WFP BANGLADESH

2023 Achievements and 2024 Outlook

In 2023, WFP's comprehensive approach in Bangladesh advanced progress towards SDG 2, with a focus on capacity strengthening, policy dialogue, and innovation. Despite funding cuts, WFP's vital assistance to Rohingya refugees remained critical amidst growing insecurity and climate challenges, emphasizing the urgency of sustained support.

Crisis Response

Emergency food and cash assistance

WFP worked to enhance the food security and nutrition for the Rohingya, as well as Bangladeshi communities affected by severe flooding in the Chittagong Hill Tracts.

School Feeding

Direct support and technical assistance

WFP provided fortified biscuits to refugee and Bangladeshi children and advocated for enhanced nutrition sensitivity in the upcoming National School Feeding Programme.



In March, WFP, in partnership with the Ministry of Primary and Mass Education published a feasibility study for the upcoming national school feeding programme. The study's recommendations form the basis for the development project proposal, aiming to reach 3.5 million children.

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Technical assistance and advocacy

WFP provided strategic and technical assistance to the Government to enhance nutrition sensitivity of key programmes, ensuring they meet the population's food security and nutritional needs.

Resilience Building

Capacity strengthening and disaster preparedness

To enhance the resilience of vulnerable communities to shocks, including climate disasters, WFP has implemented integrated risk management (IRM) approach and resilience building activities in refugee camps and Bangladeshi communities.









4,794 Bangladeshi farmers trained in climate risk insurance



29,958 Rohingyas engaged in home gardening



2,500 women trained in entrepreneurship and climateadaptive livelihoods

IRM involves anticipatory action, community asset creation, climate risk insurance, and seasonal livelihood interventions for communities living in disaster-prone regions of Bangladesh.

10,177 young Rohingya volunteers trained in capacity development

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enhance the resilience of Rohingya refugees through cash for work and cash for training activities and boost the livelihoods of their host communities through market linkage, disaster risk reduction and building/rehabilitating infrastructure.

Anticipatory Action

Emergency assistance and system strengthening


WFP and the Government have integrated anticipatory action (AA) into existing social protection programmes to generate evidence on its effectiveness in building shock-responsive systems and inform national disaster response plans.

Policy, programme and system enhancement

WFP's technical assistance in policy, programme, and system enhancement resulted in strengthening the country's largest safety net programmes and overall social protection architecture.

With WFP's technical support, the Government scaled up its programme to

reach **1.2m** mothers and young children in 2023 – five times more than in 2022



Co-authored a policy brief with the Government on using social protection to empower women economically through digital financial inclusion



MoU signed to institutionalize social protection efforts in Bangladesh

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advocate for shock-responsive social protection, implement guidelines, enhance MIS interoperability, develop monitoring systems, conduct capacity assessments, and initiate research for programme efficiency.

Emergency Preparedness

National capacity enhancement

WFP provides technical assistance including feasibility assessment, geotechnical assessment, functional design, and coordination support to the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief to prepare for emergencies.



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Supported the creation of a ministerial task force on disaster and emergency response

To strengthen capacity for emergency preparedness and response, the Ministry of Disaster Management and Relief and WFP conducted a feasibility assessment for a humanitarian staging area in Dhaka. This facility would receive and store relief supplies, ready for dispatch in the event of an emergency.



1 flood simulation exercise conducted in Sylhet, providing a platform for stakeholders to practice and refine response strategies and address gaps in preparedness.

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- Strengthen institutional capacity for effective preparedness and response to disasters and in the management of emergency supply chain.
- Search for a location for the Humanitarian Staging Area as part of emergency preparedness.





The Emergency Telecommunications Sector (ETS) provided services in collaboration with the UN Department of Safety and Security, IOM, UNHCR, WFP, and 19 member organizations of the ETS working group.

The Cox's Bazar Food Security Sector coordinated with over 60 partners, including government departments as well as the Cox's Bazar Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and the Office of the Refugee Relief and Repatriation.

On Bhasan Char, the WFP-led Food Security Sector (FSS) and the Common Services Sector worked alongside government and NGO partners for food distribution and warehouse management.

Innovation & Technology

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Digital partnership engagement

WFP continues to expand digitalization efforts and partnership engagement through SCOPE and Building Blocks, focusing on interagency coordination, shared services, cost-recovery, and capacity building to enhance service delivery.



WFP expanded the use of SCOPE to facilitate beneficiary and entitlement transfers for various programme activities. For example, SCOPE served as a proof-of-concept to support entitlement distribution for the Government's Open Market Sales (OMS) project.

A new corporate platform tested for direct cash transfers to beneficiaries' mobile accounts



Implemented cost recovery for digital services to partners



Provided advisory support to government entities for Smart Bangladesh (Single Registry and Smart Agriculture)



Built capacity of partners in management of beneficiary data in line with WFP Data protection & privacy policies

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maintain our focus on utilizing SCOPE as a comprehensive solution for beneficiary and transfer management.
