Operational Context

Nigeria is Africa's most populous and the sixth most populated country globally. Over half of the people in Nigeria are <u>multi-dimensionally poor</u>, and 65 percent of them live in the North.

Nigeria's northern states – once surplus food production areas now grapple with poverty, recurring conflicts and a widescale humanitarian crisis resulting from the internal displacement of over 2.3 million people in the <u>north-east</u> in addition to 1.09 million people in the <u>north-west</u> and <u>north-central</u> states.

Disruption of traditional agricultural livelihoods and surging cost of food, fuel, and other essential items exacerbate the situation. By May 2024, the average cost of a healthy diet had surged by 107 percent compared to the previous year. Driven by dire security and economic shocks, vulnerable people are forced into extreme survival tactics, including risking abductions and killing to forage for food in insecure areas.

As the lean season peaks between June and August 2024, the <u>March 2024 Cadre Harmonisé</u> projects that 31.8 million people across Nigeria will face hunger at crisis and emergency levels.

WFP has collaborated with the Government since 2016 to provide emergency food and nutrition assistance. Currently, WFP is implementing a five-year Country Strategic Plan (2023-2027) that aims to deliver emergency food assistance and support recovery and resilience-strengthening efforts for vulnerable people and communities. WFP's strategy for lasting solutions is aligned with national priorities while enhancing the domestic capacity for Government-led solutions.

Strategic Updates

 In May, the Government of Nigeria launched four plans for durable solutions to be implemented in Adamawa, Benue, Borno and Yobe states. At the launch event attended by the Special Adviser on Solutions to Internal Displacement to the UN Secretary-General, the Borno State Governor committed 15 percent of the its annual budget to implement the state's action plan for durable solutions.

Operational Updates

- The dire macroeconomic condition characterised by the
 persistent downward trend in the value of the naira has
 continued to push food prices atypically high. Pricing poor
 families out of the market and widening food consumption
 gaps as food stocks from the previous harvest season become
 depleted. To support crisis-affected, acutely food-insecure
 people in meeting their basic food needs despite high food
 inflation, WFP has reviewed the transfer values for food
 assistance across all activities upwards by 51.2 percent (to NGN
 11,800 per capita).
- In May, beneficiaries of WFP activities including emergency food assistance, malnutrition prevention and treatment as well as livelihood support, received US\$ 1.6 million through evouchers and cash transfers in areas where local markets could absorb cash-based assistance. In areas where markets were less functional, 6,193 mt of mixed food commodities were distributed. A total of 800,909 people received emergency food assistance through WFP's crisis response programming in May.
- WFP's malnutrition prevention activities delivered 14.8 mt of specialized nutritious foods and US\$ 21,578 in cash-based transfers to complement the basic food entitlements provided to caregivers of 7,993 children aged 6 – 23 months and 2,260 pregnant and breastfeeding women and girls.
- In a double-pronged approach to advance national rice fortification and strengthen the Kebbi State School Feeding Programme, WFP collaborated with the Global Alliance for Improved Nutrition (GAIN), to onboard 207 schools. These schools will integrate the locally fortified rice into the school-provided lunches, reaching 204,014 schoolchildren.
- Utilizing a food system integrated approach to livelihood assistance, WFP supports smallholder farmers to adopt best practices aimed at improving farm yields and reducing postharvest losses. In May, WFP trained 20 smallholder farmers (comprising mostly women and youths) to produce low-cost,

Strategic Outcome 1: People meet their urgent food and nutrition needs

CSP Outcome 1: Food-insecure internally displaced persons, refugees, returnees, and host community members in crisis-prone and conflict-affected areas of Nigeria have access to adequate nutritious food and early recovery activities that meet their immediate food needs and live in cohesive households and communities during and after shocks.

Focus area: Crisis response

Activities

- Provide food assistance and an integrated package of gendertransformative malnutrition prevention alongside social and behaviour change communication, asset-creation, skills development, and complementary livelihood activities to crisis-affected, food-insecure people
- Provide malnutrition treatment activities, alongside gendertransformative social and behaviour change communication, to children 6-59 months of age and pregnant and breastfeeding women and girls

Strategic Outcome 2: People have better nutrition, health and education outcomes

CSP Outcome 2: Nutritionally vulnerable people in Nigeria benefit from better access to healthy diets and complementary services to improve their nutrition status in line with national targets by 2027

Focus area: Resilience building

Activity:

 Support the provision of an integrated, multisectoral, gendertransformative, nutrition-sensitive package to nutritionally vulnerable groups

Strategic Outcome 3: People have improved and sustainable livelihoods

CSP Outcome 3: By 2027, targeted vulnerable households and smallholder farmers in Nigeria have improved sustainable livelihoods and enhanced social cohesion derived from food systems that are resilient to shocks and thus facilitate enhanced access to nutritious diets all year round

Focus area: Resilience building

Activities:

- Provide an integrated package of nutrition and climate adaptative livelihood activities to vulnerable households, especially those with nutritionally vulnerable groups, to improve diets
- Provide support on gender-transformative, climate-smart, youth-inclusive food production, post-harvest and commodity quality management and marketing to smallholder farmers

Strategic Outcome 4: National programmes and systems strengthened

CSP Outcome 4: National actors have strengthened capacity and an enhanced enabling environment for the development and management of food security and nutrition policies, strategies, processes, and programmes in line with national targets to achieve zero hunger by 2030

Focus area: Root causes

Activity:

 Provide nutrition-sensitive and gender-transformative technical support on emergency preparedness and response, social protection, food systems, digital solutions, policy development and coherence and other innovative approaches targeting SDG 2 to national actors, including Strategic Outcome 5: Humanitarian and development actors are more efficient and effective

CSP Outcome 5: The humanitarian community in Nigeria is enabled to reach and operate in areas of crisis throughout the year.

Focus area: Crisis response

Activities:

- Provide common logistic services to government, United Nations, and non-governmental organisation partners to facilitate effective field operations
- Provide common emergency telecommunications services to the Government, humanitarian partners and crisis-affected communities to facilitate effective field operations, provide for staff security and support the protection of affected communities
- Provide United Nations Humanitarian Air Service services (UNHAS) to all humanitarian partners
- Provide on-demand services to humanitarian actors

Monitoring

- In May, WFP collaborated with Partners in Food Solutions (PFS), TechnoServe and its implementing partner GAIN, in a quadpartite supported assessment of the technical capacity of rice millers in Nigeria. The assessment is anticipated to provide insight into the capacity gaps of domestic rice millers, forming the basis for capacity strengthening initiatives planned for the coming periods.
- WFP also participated in a joint assessment on the availability of suitable structures to support resilient food production in Borno state. The assessment, planned for piloting in Konduga, Monguno, and Ngala Local Government Areas, is anticipated to provide insight into land availability, accessibility, hydrological levels, potential for irrigation, and other sustainability factors necessary to support a food production initiative.
- WFP tracks the prices of food commodities through its routine (monthly and weekly) market monitoring activities. WFP's recently published monthly market monitoring report, indicates that compared to January, the price of the Survival Minimum Expenditure Basket increased between the ranges of 23 - 48 percent across the seven markets surveyed in Borno and Yobe states.

Challenges

- The intersection of multiple drivers of food insecurity, including armed violence, conflict and economic crisis, is driving humanitarian needs beyond seasonal projections. Meanwhile, humanitarian access continues to be affected by insecurity including the illegal vehicle checkpoints and ambushes by armed groups along supply routes leading to rural areas.
- For the next six months (between June and November), WFP requires USD 152.1 million to assist acutely food-insecure people living in conflict-affected areas.
