Operational Context

Türkiye hosts the highest number of refugees in the world -3.7 million people. Around 55,000 of the most vulnerable refugees live in seven camps in the southeast, while the majority live in cities and villages throughout the country. The Government of Türkiye has demonstrated leadership and generosity in hosting this large number for close to a decade. Since June 2014, a temporary protection regime has granted Syrian refugees access to basic services such as healthcare and education. Asylum seekers from other countries continue to benefit from International Protection

WFP re-established a presence in Türkiye in 2012, in response to the Syria crisis and transitioned its programmes from purely basic needs assistance to include more livelihoods support as the needs of the target population evolved. WFP Türkiye's seeks to continue assisting refugees in camps, provide services to humanitarian and development partners, and implement sustainable livelihood programming to build the self-reliance of vulnerable refugees. devastating earthquakes of February 2023, focusing on restoring and revitalising the food value chain in the earthquake-affected regions that will benefit vulnerable Turks and refugees alike.

Operational Updates

- In July, under the In-camp E-voucher Programme, WFP and the Turkish Red Crescent (TRC) assisted 33,672 beneficiaries (7,836 households) in six refugee camps with an e-voucher of Turkish lira (TRY) 300 (USD 9) per person per month to meet their food and non-food needs. The e-vouchers are redeemable at contracted markets in the camps.
- WFP and its cooperating partner, the Association for Social Development and Aid Mobilization (ASAM), launched a multi-purpose cash programme to assist earthquake-affected Syrian refugees in Hilalkent Container City in the southern province of Hatay starting in August 2024. Beneficiaries will receive TRY 500 (USD 15) per person per month to meet their basic needs.
- Under the **Earthquake Recovery Programme**, aiming to restore and revitalize the local food value chain disrupted by the February 2023 earthquakes, a wide range of activities were implemented in July in various cities to assist earthquake-affected refugees and members of the host community:
 - o In Hatay, under the project with the Danish Refugee Council (DRC) in Altinozu District, seven Syrian Cashfor-Work (CFW) participants have begun two months of employment on the agricultural lands of two farmers, receiving minimum wage. In Samandag District, under the project with World Vision, 100 small farmers were selected for agriculture training aimed at restoring the fruit and vegetable value chain.
 - In Adiyaman, WFP and the International Migration and Solidarity Association (UGDD) provided 49 small farmers with seeds and seedlings which helped them to harvest agricultural produce, including peppers, cucumbers, parsley, and eggplants, and sell them at local markets.
 - In Kahramanmaras, under the project with DRC aiming to restore the dairy supply chain, 19 dairy farmers and processors received restoration proposal writing" training to help them grow their businesses. They will then submit proposals to become eligible to receive dairy equipment under the assistance program. The four-

day training achieved full participation. Under the project with the Association of Assistance, Solidarity and Support with Refugees and Asylum Seekers (YSYD), 17 dairy farmers in Kahramanmaras were selected to receive a long-term asset grant package, which included livestock, milking machine, churning equipment to support their work.

• Under WFP's Socioeconomic Empowerment and Sustainability (SES) Programme, 323 participants attended vocational training (VT) and applied training (ATP) in July, enabling some 1,740 people (members of the participant's household) to benefit from the programme indirectly. Participants were enrolled in soft skills courses in Adiyaman, Malatya and Kahramanmaras, marking the final cohort for VTs before the programme concludes at the end of October. ATPs continue in Adana, Adiyaman, Gaziantep, Kahramanmaras, Malatya, Mersin and Sanliurfa. ATP places VT graduates into jobs to gain practical experience and become familiar with the sector, all while earning a minimum wage.

Monitoring

- According to the Q2 2024 Market Bulletin (April-June), the cost of the Minimum Expenditure Basket (MEB) is TRY 2,740 per person per month as of June 2024. In the earthquake-affected areas, this figure reached TRY 2,966 in the same period. The food basket cost slightly increased from TRY 989 in Q1 to TRY 1,034 in Q2. Meanwhile, the inflation rate dropped from 75 percent in May to 72 percent in June, while the food inflation remained steady at 69 percent. Finally, the unemployment rate remained stable at 8.5 percent in May 2024.
- The findings of the Q2 Livelihood Monitoring Report reveal that the SES Programme demonstrated significant achievements while facing various challenges to date. With 6,659 enrolments and a 51 percent employment rate, the programme met its employment target, particularly excelling in the manufacturing sector. However, dropout rates remained a concern, especially among women and refugees, with 67 percent of participants dropping out mainly because of the lengthy waiting period to be matched with employers for their ATP. Nevertheless, by June 2024, all short- and long-term employment goals had been met. The report also found that active monitoring and outreach efforts were instrumental in addressing participant concerns and enhancing programme visibility. Finally, the continuous support of the programme to 23,762 indirect beneficiaries (members of the households of the participants) highlighted the broader positive impact of SES, reaffirming its complementary role in strengthening the self-reliance of vulnerable populations through increased access to livelihood opportunities.
- According to the <u>Q2 Post-Distribution Monitoring Report</u> from the Elazig camp hosting Ukrainian refugees, 57 percent of beneficiary households are headed by women and 62 percent include children. Also, 16 percent of families have at least one member with a disability or a pregnant or breastfeeding woman. While only 3 percent of the residents are food insecure, a substantial 94 percent are vulnerable to food insecurity. Half of the residents report that their main income source is external support from family and friends, followed by unskilled non-agricultural wage labour. Additionally, the e-voucher assistance serves as a secondary income source for half of the families.
