

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

General Food Assistance

- 519,300 vulnerable people received unconditional lifesaving assistance
- 71% of people assisted under emergency response
- 7,182 mt and USD 9.9 million distributed
- **51%** received **cash assistance** (upscaled from 29% in 2023)
- 131,000 people assisted under flood response in the Far North Region
- 13,250 displaced individuals assisted under the RRM (Rapid Response Mechanism)

FFA for Early Recovery

FFA: Food Assistance for Asset Creation

- 18,270 activity participants received cash transfers
- USD 320,800 distributed
- **209 ha farms**/gardens, yielded 88 mt of produce
- 606 poultry farms (10,268 chicks) generated USD 41,000
- **26 goat sheds** with 1,329 goats
- 52 fishponds stocked with 18,700 fingerlings
- 62 VSLAs formed
- **3,676 people** supported in IGAs

Nutrition Support

- 158,525 malnourished people (110,194 children) received
 1,565 mt of SNFs (Specialized Nutritious Foods)
- 86,490 children aged 6-59 months and 25,900 PBW/G assisted under MAM management – 98.6% recovery
- 33,070 children and PBW/G received SNFs as top-up rations
- **198,600 people** participated in culinary demonstrations
- 45 VSLAs and 7 cooperatives for PLHIV supported and members trained on IGAs

School Feeding in Emergencies

- 32,100 pupils in the Far North Region received hot meals in schools
- 47 elementary schools involved
- Meals comprised cereals, vegetable oil, pulses, salt cooked with local spices
- 9% increase in enrolment rate



RESILIENCE BUILDING

- 1. Children 6-23 months, adolescent girls, pregnant and lactating women and other nutritionally vulnerable people have improved nutrition status and resilience
- 2. Food-insecure and climate-affected populations and smallholder farmers have enhanced livelihoods and resilience to shocks

Nutrition Support

- 500,000 children screened for malnutrition
- COHA report (Cost of Hunger in Africa) finalised
- 11 food transformation enterprises trained
- 45 positive deviance homes for nutritional rehabilitation established
- 2,775 stakeholders trained on IYCF & MUAC.
- 4,640 PBW/G (Pregnant and Breastfeeding Women & Girls) received USD 35,600

Home-Grown School Feeding, HGSF

- 71,850 pupils in 107 schools received school meals
- 70 smallholder farmer cooperatives linked to schools
- 1,428 small producers from 26 cooperatives supplied food items to schools
- 327 tonnes of food commodities supplied, valued at USD 892,500
- Supported technical validation of draft national school feeding strategy

FFA Resilience

- 77,610 people assisted conditionally, with USD 2.9 million and 277 mt of food
- 209 ha community fields, 150 ha pasture, and 8,990 trees planted
- 92 fishponds created
- 97 community ponds and 10 solar boreholes dug
- 34 culverts, 14 diversion bays and 61 km feeder roads constructed/rehabilitated
- 70 community storage units
- 183 savings groups created

Support to Smallholder Farmers (SAMS)

- 22,580 smallholder farmers
 (SHF) from 691 farmer groups
 assisted
- 1,592 farmers trained on postharvest management
- 95 FFS (Farmer Field School) for climate-smart agriculture demonstrations to 3,000 SHF
- 18 agriculture-based SME trained in procurement
- 180 VSLAs (village savings and loans association) created with 5,940 SHF members and trained.

The government and partners can reach vulnerable populations and respond to emergencies throughout the year



Global Commodity Management Facility (GCMF)

Extended support to Sudan and Nigeria (including Cameroon, Chad and CAR) through the **Douala Corridor**

48,350 mt of food **dispatched** to Chad to support the Sudanese crisis response

119,700 mt of food received 99,000 mt dispatched through the Douala Corridor



UN Humanitarian Air Service

- **3 destinations**: Yaounde, Maroua, N'Djamena (Chad)
- 150 flights
- 3,175 passengers and 12 mt of light cargo transported
- 53 humanitarian organisations served
- 98% passenger satisfaction rate
- Regional training on dangerous goods led by HQ



Support to MINSANTE

- **490,100 mosquito nets** transported to 99 health centres in Northwest and Southwest regions
- **393 cubic metres of vaccines** (6.7 million doses) transported
- 257 officials trained in thermo-sensitive logistics and Quality Management Systems



Local Procurement

- 4,013 mt of locally produced sorghum and salt
- 3,000 mt of imported rice
- USD 4.9 million injected into the local economy

Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment

- Participation in the 68th Commission on the Status of Women (CSW68) led by MINPROFF
- MoU and action plan with MINPROFF drafted
- MoU with UNFPA for joint programming and advocacy
- Implementation of 2-Yyear women's empowerment project with UNWOMEN in Far North
- Supported MINEDUB and MINPROFF participation in the 1st Pan African Conference in Girls and Women's Education.
- Award programme for best performing teenage girls in the Southwest Region under the Education Cannot Wait coalition
- 11,200 women participated in PULCCA activities, capacity strengthening and establishing IGAs, VSLAs
- 60 percent of WFP beneficiaries were women



Gender-Based Violence (GBV)

- Developed training modules for staff and cooperating partners
- Advocacy and information sessions during the 16 days of activism against GBV

Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA)

 Trained 150 staff from 21 cooperating partners and stakeholders on PSEA

Accountability to Affected People (AAP)

- National AAP Working Group lead
- WFP led the rollout of the joint Humanitarian Community Feedback Mechanism (HCFM)
- 100% compliance with the 6 assurance CFM standards
- 7 feedback channels: hotline, complaints committees, suggestion boxes, helpdesks, focus group discussions, cooperating partners and WFP staff
- Community Engagement Action Plan (CE-AP) developed
- Piloted BHA project: 'Understand, Engage and Respond: Inclusive tool for Inclusive systems'
- Assisted people reported improved access, safety and dignity in WFP programmes compared to early 2024


