Operational Context

Madagascar is a low-income country facing endemic poverty, climate and economic shocks. In 2024, 80 percent of the national population lived below the international poverty line, according to the <u>World Bank's Macro Poverty Outlook (2025)</u>. For most of the 80 percent of the population whose main activity is agriculture, generating enough income to exit poverty is beyond their reach, due to limited market access and lagging agricultural productivity.

Climate change has exacerbated Madagascar's vulnerability to weather shocks, including cyclones, tropical storms and droughts. According to the latest IPC analysis, 1.93 million people faced high levels of acute food insecurity (IPC Phase 3 and above) between January and April 2025, particularly in the Grand Sud and Grand Sud-Est.

In this context, the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) aims to promote an integrated, shock-responsive social protection system to ensure that vulnerable populations have access to nutritious food before, during and after crises. It also aims to provide children in vulnerable communities with access to nutritious foods while at school and extend integrated approaches for the prevention of malnutrition among women, adolescent girls and children. Moreover, WFP aims to help build the resilience of smallholder households and ensure that interventions to address both chronic and acute needs are supported by enhanced capacities and resources for emergency preparedness and response.

Emergency Response

Anticipatory actions: WFP distributed anticipatory cash (120,000 ariary per household) and disseminated drought-related early warning messages to vulnerable and climate-affected people in the Tsihombe District. In addition, WFP held a meeting with the National Office for Risk and Disaster Management (BNGRC) to discuss joint priorities for anticipatory action, including cross-cutting themes such as gender, protection and inclusion. Both parties agreed to enhance collaboration on generating and disseminating evidence on anticipatory actions.

Capacity strengthening: WFP handed over two 4x4 vehicles and 10 radios to the BNGRC, supporting its decentralization efforts.

UN Humanitarian Air Services (UNHAS)

In May 2025, UNHAS transported 276 passengers and 831 kg of humanitarian cargo, serving nine regular destinations and supporting 31 organizations. On 31 May and 1 June, UNHAS Madagascar participated in the air show organized by the Malagasy Air Force in celebration of its 65th anniversary. The event served as an opportunity to showcase UNHAS operations and emphasize its critical role in facilitating humanitarian access to remote areas across Madagascar. On 28 May, UNHAS convened a User Group Meeting to present recent operational updates, gather partners' forecasts for the second half of the year, and discuss priorities and adjustments to the flight schedule.

Nutrition

Food processing units: The construction of two community food processing units, located in Vohilava (Farafangana district) and in Beabo (Ambovombe district), was finalized on 7 May. A third unit, located in Ifotaka (Amboasary district), is nearing completion. Installation of technical equipment will follow the completion of civil works. Once operational, these units will enable smallholder farmers to produce improved nutritious products, based on recipes developed by the Mikasa platform. On 15 May, the WFP Director and Country Representative in Madagascar visited the Vohilava and Beabo units to assess progress on the ground.

WHO wasting prevention guidelines: On 16 May, WFP and the Ministry of Health validated the training curriculum on the prevention and management of acute malnutrition in children and pregnant and breastfeeding women (PBWG). The perspective is the organization of cascade training sessions for health workers and community actors for June

Strategic Outcome 1: People affected by seasonal or other shocks are prepared and able to meet their immediate food and nutrition needs throughout the year. *Focus area: Crisis response*

School Feeding

Cash transfers to schools: Cash-transfers were extended to schools enrolled in the home-grown school feeding programme in the Grand Sud, while a second round of transfers was completed for schools in the Highlands. 365 schools received the necessary funds to purchase fresh, locally sourced products.

HGSF workshop: From 18-24 May, WFP, the regional focal points for the FSRP project, and the regional public authorities on education, sustainable development and nutrition gathered for a workshop on the implementation of home-grown school feeding in Itasy and Vakinankaratra regions. The workshop aimed to strengthen synergies, promote local ownership and enhance the programme's long-term sustainability.

School Connect: On 29–30 May, representatives from WFP and the Ministry of National Education participated in a training session on the *School Connect* tool, which centralizes data related to school feeding programme management—including schools, food distribution, beneficiaries, and other key indicators. The training was led by a staff member from WFP's School Connect Team at headquarters. Participants will in turn train decentralized technical teams in 50 schools across five districts, selected for the pilot phase of *School Connect*, scheduled to launch in early June.

Resilience

KfW field visit: From 8-16 May 2025, a delegation of the German Development bank KfW visited Madagascar to monitor progress under the joint WFP-UNICEF project "Building Resilience for Food and Nutrition Security in Madagascar", funded by Germany. The mission focused on three target communes in the Anosy and Androy regions, each with a specific thematic emphasis. In Sihanamaro, the delegation reviewed efforts to improve water access, strengthen local governance, and enhance cross-sectoral coordination, including visits to multiuse water points and rehabilitated ponds. In Tsivory, the focus was on resilience and livelihoods, with site visits to community gardens, Farmer Field Schools, and agroecological restoration areas. In Ifotaka, the team assessed integrated nutrition and social protection interventions, including FARNE centers, local food processing units, and social service hubs. The mission emphasized the integration of project activities into local development planning and the reinforcement of communitybased systems. It also provided an opportunity to deepen strategic dialogue with local authorities and partners.

Resource Outlook

USD 49.4 million is urgently required for WFP Madagascar to sustain all activities of the Country Strategic Plan between June and November 2025.
