

# WFP South Sudan Weekly Market Price Bulletin

**04 – 10 August 2025** 

## 1. EXCHANGE RATES

The South Sudan Pound (SSP) recorded a slight appreciation after months of stability, the reference rate remained unchanged from last week. In Juba, the parallel market exchange rate stood at SSP 5,950 per US dollar, against reference rate of SSP 4,528. This has narrowed the premium between the two rates from 35 to 31 percent, still reflecting persistent unmet demand for US dollars and the inability of the formal sector to meet the demands. Year-on-Year the depreciated by 23 and 42 percent on the parallel market and at banks, respectively.

Figure 1. Exchange rates in Juba (SSP/US\$)



## 2. FOOD BASKET COSTS

The monthly per capita cost of the standard food basket stood at SSP 116,200 on average, a 5 percent increase within a week and 19 percent higher than a month ago. Although exchange rates appreciated slightly, food basket costs remained high and have increased in some locations, weakening the purchasing power of households already stretched by multiple shocks and exacerbating their economic vulnerability.

Markets in Abyei, Yida, Makpandu and Juba witnessed rises in food basket costs between 15 and 30 percent week-on-week,

while Malakal and Wau had relatively smaller increases of around 10 percent. The intensification of seasonal rains has impacted the availability of goods in these markets, creating scarcity and pushing up prices. In Juba, where the exchange rate has appreciated and road access is not a challenge, the increase in the food basket cost could be attributed to other factors including local taxes. The ongoing conflict in Fangak continues to hamper normal trade movement, making Old Fangak the most expensive of all markets in the country, with

a food basket costing three times the national average. Other markets with food basket costs above the national average included Rubkona, Juba, Malakal, Chukudum and Bunj. Over the past month, food basket costs rose by between 15 and 40 percent in Makpandu, Rubkona, Abyie and Juba, while prices changed less in other markets. Compared to April 2023, before the onset of the crisis in Sudan, the average cost of a food basket across markets increased eight-fold.

Notes: The standard food basket includes 15kgs of cereals, 1.5kgs of pulse, 0.9kg of cooking oil and 0.15kg of salt. The national average for the previous week(s) and the pre-crisis period in Sudan remains unchanged, regardless of the monitoring coverage during the reporting week.

#### 3. STAPLE FOOD PRICES

The availability of white sorghum was rated below normal in Abyei, Yida, Chukudum and Old Fangak markets due to seasonal access challenges, coupled with insecurity in the case of Old Fangak. In Western Equatoria, seasonal harvests have eased the availability of staples – maize and cassava – improving farming households' access to food from own production and minimizing their dependence on markets.

During the first week of August, white sorghum prices in Old Fangak remained unchanged at SSP 70,000/malua (3.5 kg). Prices of white sorghum in Rubkona, Chukudum and Juba ranged between SSP 20,000/malua and SSP 30,000/malua, while in the remaining monitored markets, prices were between SSP 12,000/malua in Renk and SSP 17,000/malua in Wau. White sorghum prices increased by between 15 and 20 percent week-on-week in Juba, Wau, Yida and Abyei markets.

#### 4. PRICES OF IMPORTED FOODS

As compared to last week, prices of imported food items have remained stable in most markets. However, wheat flour and maize flour prices increased in Kuajok by 15 percent and 10 percent, respectively. Additionally, wheat flour prices rose by 15 percent in Yida. In Old Fangak, the availability of imported food items was very minimal, and prices stayed at elevated

levels. Prices of wheat flour were the highest in Rubkona (SSP 16,200/kg), followed by Malakal (SSP 12,000/kg), Bunj (SSP 10,000/kg) and Renk (SSP 9,000/kg). In the remaining monitored markets, wheat flour prices ranged between SSP 5,000/kg and SSP 6,000/kg. Sugar prices were highest in Old Fangak (SSP 19,000/kg), followed by Rubkona (SSP 17,200/kg), Budi (SSP 15,000/kg), and Malakal (SSP 14,000/kg).

## 5. FUEL PRICES

The slight appreciation of the local currency led to a drop in fuel prices in Juba and Aweil by 6 percent. Additionally, fuel prices dropped by 17 percent in Akobo due to delivery of new stocks. However, price levels in Akobo remained among the highest in monitored markets. Fuel prices increased by 6 percent in Rubkona and Wau markets. Since February 2024, fuel prices have surged both in formal and informal markets by more than 400 percent.
