Management Response from WFP South Sudan Country Office to the recommendations of the decentralized evaluation of School Feeding Programme in South Sudan from 2018 to 2023 (DE/SSCO/2022/026).



- 1. This document, finalized in August 2025, presents the management response to the recommendations of the evaluation of the School Feeding Programme in South Sudan
- 2. The evaluation, which was commissioned by WFP South Sudan Country Office covers the School Feeding Programme in South Sudan from 2018 to 2023. The purposes of the evaluation were to serve the mutually reinforcing objectives of accountability and learning and assessed the performance and results of the School Feeding Programme, and long-term effects of the programme including intended, and unintended outcomes, and negative or positive outcomes for targeted (girls, boys, men, and women), communities and institutions.
- 3. The evaluation made ten recommendations, the majority of them operational, with three being strategic Sub-recommendations elaborate on how each recommendation can be implemented
