Highlights

- In response to ongoing fighting in Upper Nile, WFP is preparing a response to assist recently displaced populations.
- The 2017 prepositioning plan has been finalized through which WFP aims to deliver 114,000mt of food to secure locations throughout the country over the next four months.

Highlights

- WFP is closely monitoring the security situation in Upper Nile where heavy fighting has been reported leading to the displacement of the local population. WFP and World Vision are planning to deploy an integrated rapid response mechanism (IRRM) team in the coming week to conduct a headcount and food distribution in Aburoc—a location where displaced populations have congregated. The IRRM team will also look at mitigation measures for protection concerns including mobility and vulnerability issues.
- Ongoing fighting and insecurity in the Equatorias continues to result in high levels of displacement, with an average of 3,657 new arrivals reported in Uganda per day. The majority (86 percent) of new arrivals are women and children, and more than half are children under age 18.

WFP Response

Food and Nutrition Assistance

- WFP, in collaboration with German Agro Action (GAA) and IOM, has started biometric registration of populations in Panyijar county. Teams will be on the ground for the next two months with support from WFP's Nairobi regional bureau to register about 150,000 people in <u>SCOPE</u>, WFP's digital platform for registration and management of beneficiary lists. WFP's gender and protection staff are also participating in the exercise to conduct assessments and monitor the situation on the ground.
- WFP is rolling out its new HIV/TB strategy through which people living with HIV and TB will receive food and nutrition assistance to treat and prevent acute malnutrition while helping to ensure that those on treatment are adhering to their medication. To support

the strategy, WFP supported a national survey to gather baseline data on the nutrition and food security situation of people living with HIV. One of the most striking findings of the study was that people on HIV treatment (ART), are more food insecure than people living with HIV who are not yet on treatment. This is a worrying finding as people who are food insecure are less likely to adhere to their treatment and good adherence is critical for treatment success for both TB and HIV. This finding along with other key nutrition and food security findings were part of the justification in improving the existing strategy which was developed in consultation with the Government of South Sudan.

- WFP continues to provide assistance to displaced populations in Wau town. Over the last week, WFP provided household food rations to 11,000 people in three camps for displaced people. Alongside these general food distributions, WFP provides fortified nutritious foods for the prevention of acute malnutrition.
- Despite insecurity in the Greater Upper Nile region, Integrated Rapid Response Mechanism (IRRM) teams are conducting food distributions in 11 locations serving 353,250 people. Of these, 67,860 are children aged 6-59 months whose families will receive fortified nutritious foods specialized for this age group to prevent acute malnutrition.



• Every year, WFP undertakes a massive prepositioning exercise during the dry season while roads are open to ensure that commodities are available in the deep field during the rainy season when roads become impassable. WFP has finalized the 2017 prepositioning plan through which 114,000mt of food commodities will be stocked in 60 locations throughout the country. The prepo sites were selected based on accessibility in the dry season, proximity to targeted populations, capacity to deliver and the ability to ensure the safety and security of food assets. Over the next four months, WFP will increase road deliveries in an effort to meet the prepositioning requirements.

Clusters and Common Services

Food Security & Livelihoods Cluster (FSLC)

• The FSLC secretariat continues to support for the re-establishment of technical working groups in agriculture, cash based transfers and livestock. In addition, the FSLC is conducting mapping of subnational food security and livelihoods coordination forums.

Logistics Cluster

- In the past week, the Logistics Cluster coordinated the delivery of 149mt of humanitarian relief items to Akobo, Dablual, Ganyiel, Kuernyang, Lafon, Mathiang, Jangok, Motot, New Fangak, Nyal, and Yambio on behalf of 14 organizations.
- The Logistics Cluster coordinated its third interagency convoy along the western corridor on behalf of IOM, UNICEF and Welthungerhilfe.

🛧 UN Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS)

- Over the last week UNHAS transported 1,740 passengers and 36mt of light humanitarian cargo. Five medical evacuations were facilitated on scheduled flights from Malakal, Rubkona, Rumbek and Yambio for three organizations. One security relocation was facilitated from Nyal to Juba for IOM.
- UNHAS provided support for 77 WFP airdrop flights, delivering 2,367mt of food commodities. IRRM team deployments were supported to Wan, Nyal, Kandak and Mogok.
- UNHAS supported an inter-agency assessment mission to the islands of Loth and Mier (Unity) with participation from two humanitarian partners.
- UNHAS continues to support the child reunification efforts of UNICEF, reuniting seven children with their families in Malakal, Rubkona, Mayom and Juba.
- Flights were cancelled to five destinations in Jonglei due to crew sickness and to insecurity in Upper Nile. Flights were resumed to Malakal.
